Trauma – Attachment – Personality

We invite you for 2005 to our 14th World Congress of the World Association for Dynamic Psychiatry and the 27th International Symposium of the German Academy for Psychoanalysis (DAP) in Cracow, Poland. We do this from the background of the latest developments in psychotherapy, psychiatry, neurology and psychology, not least in our hosts' country, Poland.

The congress' central issues will be the genesis, symptomatology and treatment of psychotrauma, as well as the relationship between trauma research and the findings in attachment theory, the psychology of personality and development and in brain research.

After the psychoanalytic pioneer works of Freud, Ferenczi, Ammon and others, a scientific discussion on the consequences of traumatizing experiences on a broader level has not been led before the middle of the last century. It became forced by the distress and anguish of the Holocaust survivors and their descendants, later the Vietnam veterans as well as uncountable victims of violence, war and expulsion, but also victims of natural catastrophes and accidents. Parallel to this, the understanding of psychic and psychosomatic effects of early childhood traumatization, due to assault and battery, sexual abuse and emotional deprivation, deepened.

Recent trauma-research findings established links between really experienced traumata and biological restrictions, representing the correlate of psychic illness, and on their part blocking the further development of personality. As psycho-traumatic experiences do not only have psychic consequences, but also effects the brain structures, understanding, knowledge and treatment make a holistic, interdisciplinary co-operation necessary, in order to equally meet the somatic, psychic and mental dimensions.

The importance of secure, or insecure patterns of attachment as well as the quality of the surrounding group-dynamic field's social energy as a factor of protection or rather risk, in regard to the genesis and mastering of traumatizations will take up much space.

Concerning the treatment of traumatized patients this means to examine to what extent the success of special trauma-therapeutic techniques is connected to the embedding into a constructive, social-energetic, psychotherapeutically effective field.

The transgenerational transmission of trauma will be another important theme of the congress. Here, a wide field for research is still open.

Task and aim of this congress will be to take up the theme's challenges for research, treatment and prevention, as well as for the society as a whole, including the discussion of historical, cultural and social dimensions. It is our concern to bring together the representatives of as many different psychotherapeutic schools and special disciplines as possible, as the chances for further development are to be found especially in this multidisciplinary teams. Thus the congress will contribute to further progress with the necessary integration of medicine, brain physiology, psychology and psychiatry, psychotherapeutic research, as well as the adjoining humanities and social sciences.

The congress events, as the plenary meetings, symposia, and workshops, will also bring up the issue of prevention of psychic disturbances, like neurotic and personality disorders, and borderline disease, which at the present time, according to the World Health Organization (WHO), show the widest spreading worldwide.

Scientists from more than 20 nations from all parts of the world and from different cultures will be expected.

This congress will be carried through with the support of several international organizations, such as the World Psychiatric Association, the World Association of Social Psychiatry, the World Association of Psychosocial Rehabilitation and others.

Special and explicit thanks go to our Polish colleagues, especially the professors Aleksandrowicz, Bomba and Orwid and their co-workers for the organization of this congress.


